Program Updates

A Survivor's Story of Courage and Community

Over the past few years, YWCA Missoula has seen a startling rise in the number of survivors of human trafficking in our Pathways program. In 2019 and 2020, we provided services to six or seven trafficking survivors annually through our shelter, crisis line, and walk-in peer counseling. By 2021, that number had doubled to 14—and **last year, we served 50 survivors of trafficking**.

Izara's story (*name changed*) is one of the most complex and extraordinary cases we've encountered. After fleeing an arranged marriage and trafficking, she took a daring leap for freedom. She escaped from her abusive husband and eventually made her way to the YWCA domestic violence shelter, where she stayed for three months. Originally from West Africa, Izara had limited understanding of English, and she worked closely with advocates who provided both logistical and emotional support. The fear of returning to her abusive partner—and the certainty that she would be killed if she returned—was overwhelming for Izara. Yet, our advocates, alongside Ries Law Group, tapped into legal networks and helped Izara seek asylum in Canada. Key partners, including YWCA chapters in Helena and Great Falls, played vital roles in providing shelter along her journey. A cab driver even transported her across the Canadian border to reunite with family.

Months later, Izara's younger sister Esi, a "backup bride" for the same arranged marriage, arrived at YWCA Missoula. Our team helped her gather the necessary documents and ensured her safe travel to Canada to join Izara.

This story reflects the determination and resourcefulness of our advocates, who continually go above and beyond to solve complex problems. With the support of dedicated community partners, they ensure that no survivor falls through the cracks. When abusers tell their victims, "No one will help you," our Pathways advocates are there ready to prove them wrong— providing not only safety but also hope and the belief that everyone is worthy of dignity and care.

In September, we recognize National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, also known as **Orange Shirt Day**, on the 30th. This day honors First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Survivors of the Residential

"School" System and their families. It serves as a solemn reminder of the Indigenous children taken from their communities and the lasting impacts on their families and cultures. The orange shirt became a powerful symbol of this, inspired by Phyllis Jack Webstad's story. On her first day of residential school, her new orange shirt was taken from her and never returned. This symbol reflects the system's attempt to erase Indigenous identities through forced assimilation.
